who are prescribing opioids for chronic pain outside of active cancer treatment, palliative care, and end-of-life care.



This guideline is intended to improve communication between clinicians and patients about the risks and benefits of opidid therapy for chronic pain, improve the safety and effectiveness of pain treatment, and reduce the risks associated with long-term opioid therapy, including opioid use disorder, overdose, and death. 
